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President's Message

How quickly five years have passed...

The end of 2011 marked the end of our fifth year of operation as a foundation. We began with the formulation of our mission statement to serve God by serving others. This was, and is, our guiding principle; blessed by God, we seek to serve those in need in our community.

We were certainly novices in the early days but we enjoyed, then and now, the teaching and mentorship of our good and wise friend, Curtis Meadows, and we watched and learned from so many other experienced foundations, notably The Meadows Foundation and its warm and open program staff. As we learned, we enjoyed so many positive experiences with

so many impressive organizations too many to list here, but all of which, collectively, have given us a sense of joy and appreciation for the service they have given to those in need. Thanks to all who have helped us along the way.

Our 2011 grants are listed in the following pages and all have their own stories, challenges and hopes for successes. We look forward to hearing more about them as time goes by. A few are notable because they tell a lot about our developing priorities.

We remain very interested in the welfare of children, particularly those who have been abused or neglected or who simply have been born into conditions that do not allow

them to thrive. On the forefront of this very difficult work is the Institute of Child Development at TCU. In 2011, we were pleased to renew our partnership with the Institute and especially pleased to see the work they are doing with child welfare agencies, churches, counselors and others serving children in our state and across the country. The Institute's Trust-Based Relational Intervention model for addressing the needs of foster and adopted children is being rigorously tested and applied by an increasing number of service providers. And the Institute's leadership in implementing systems of trauma informed care continues to bring hope for children who are affected by traumatic events such as family violence and abuse.

Also at work for the same constituency is Children's Medical Center where the dedicated team in the Foster Care Clinic is testing and applying an innovative program for the delivery of medical care to foster children in ways that affect the whole child and provide stability to the children and families served.

Good parenting, of course, is one of the keys to the growth and development of children and the prevention of abuse and neglect so we also note the terrific work of The ARKGroup, Dallas Concilio and the collaborative group of agencies working in the Bachman Lake area of Dallas with parents

of pre-school children in that area. Our hope is that these and other efforts to develop new ways to effectively address the needs of our children will be successful and lead to the widespread improvement in the lives of those directly served and in the services delivered across our state.

We have also continued to assist those programs that promote in our youth the development of good moral character, personal responsibility and an appreciation of the value of hard work. The education of our youth is of course important and we applaud those who are raising the standards, expectations and performances of our schools. But more than this, we look for and want to support those who emphasize respect in the classroom, the value of hard work, the importance of honesty and personal responsibility, and the satisfaction that comes from achieving goals. This emphasis on character development can be seen in the halls of public schools such as those in the Uplift charter network and the Irma Rangel Young Women's Leadership School, and in private schools such as West Dallas Community School, St. Philip's and Bishop Dunne. We will continue to support programs that emphasize these qualities in our youth both in our schools and in the after-school and out-of-school time programs that are such essential parts of the youth development effort.

We made many other grants in 2011 and all are important. We believe each supported agency is worthy of our support and we thank them all for the hard work and dedication to the cause of improving the lives of people in our community.

One final note. In 2011, we continued our support of a small number of international programs of which International Justice Mission is one. Among other things, IJM has been hard at work for a number of years in actively and directly investigating instances in India involving human slavery and sex trafficking of young girls. This work has been instrumental in the rescue of hundreds of victims in some of the largest cities in India. Our grant in 2011 is designed to go farther; to help them transform the system of justice in India to actually eradicate these horrible practices. One might say this is an insurmountable task in a country as large as India. Recently, we were encouraged to hear that IJM's work with law enforcement agencies in one of the large cities in India produced a rescue of 42 bonded laborers from a brick kiln. What is exciting to us is that this rescue stemmed not from IJM's first investigation but from IJM's training of the law enforcement agencies on the importance of working to transform their own cities; a testament to the power of God working through dedicated people seeking to serve God by serving others.

We have learned a lot in the last five years and I believe we have matured in our mission and focus. We remain motivated by our faith and by the energy and perseverance of our partners who conduct the programs we so admire and touch the constituents who are in such need. Thanks to all of them for another fulfilling year.

The Rees-Jones Foundation is a private foundation established in 2006 by Jan and Trevor Rees-Jones, primarily to benefit the people of North Texas. The Foundation provides support and funding for programs that help improve, in tangible ways, the quality of life of the people it serves, with special emphasis on assisting children and their families who are striving for better life circumstances.

Our resources are directed to the support and development of programs that relieve hunger, provide medical care for the mentally and physically ill, provide educational opportunities for children and youth, develop opportunities for employment and economic advancement, provide affordable housing and shelter, and encourage Christian spiritual development.

Our focus is on programs that have a measurable impact on the lives of children and youth and their families and that provide the basic ingredients for success in education and physical, mental, and spiritual development.



Five Years of Grantmaking

From 2007 through 2011 The Rees-Jones Foundation approved 643 grants totaling approximately \$158 million in six different program areas...

We have been gratified to see how these grants have benefitted and will continue to benefit our neighbors in the Dallas/Fort Worth area and around the world. Close to home, those who need food, housing, education, health care, therapy, protection, and even recreation have been touched by the agencies we have supported. People in Africa have received clean water and critical health care, while families in India have been rescued from oppression. We are not equipped to do any of this work ourselves, but through grant making we have been blessed to participate in the selfless work of others reaching out to the least of these.

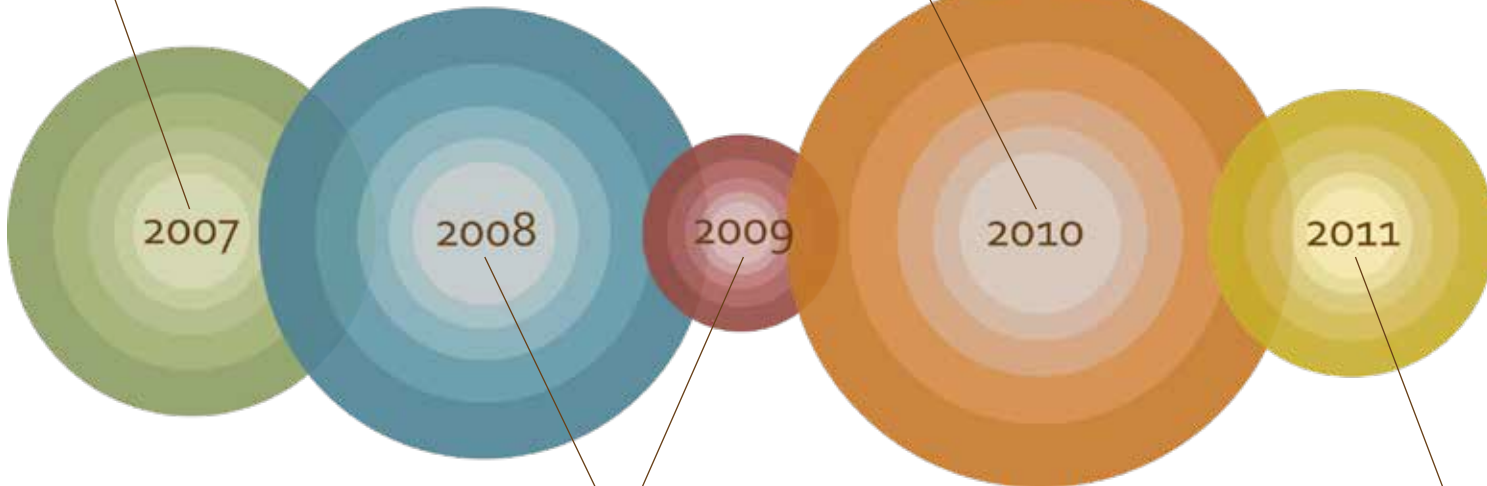

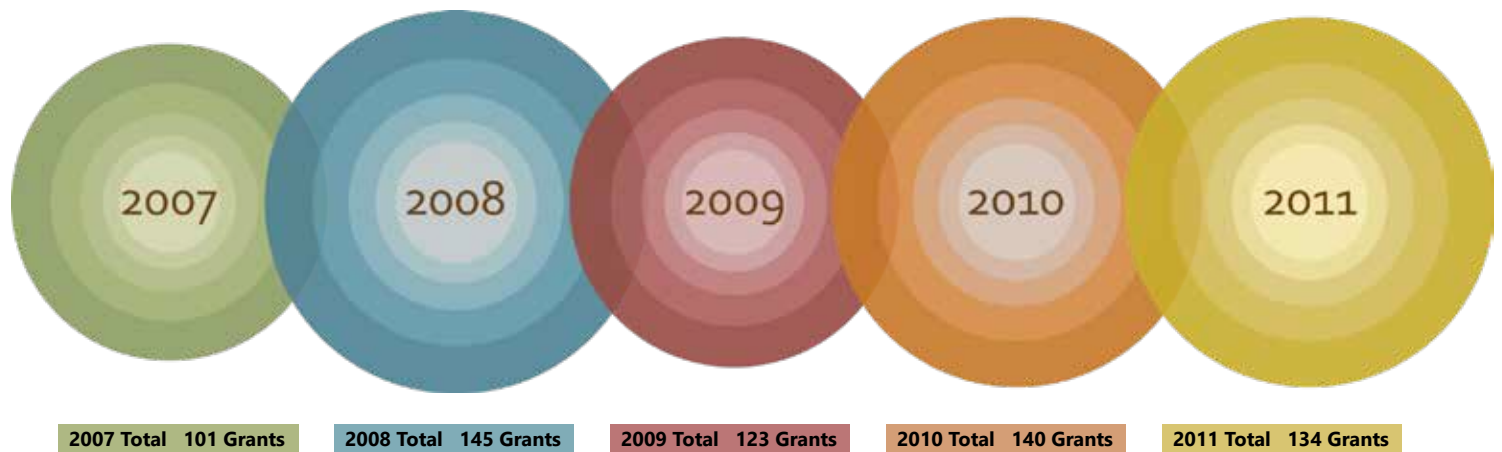

The Civic Responsibility of Education...

Our commitment to the **Perot Museum of Nature and Science** (2007 & 2010), reflected in two grants totaling \$25 million, stems from the inspiration it offers to children in our community to pursue the study of nature, science and technology. These are opportunities every child should have and the museum will open doors for children to learn in creative ways about such things as plant and animal life on our planet, our dynamic earth, our developing energy technology, our universe, and the history of our world from dinosaurs to present day. We categorize these grants as education and certainly they are motivated by the desire to expand the educational experience of our youth. But we also recognize the importance to our city and surrounding communities of an institution such as the Perot Museum of Nature and Science. It will inspire children and adults for decades to come.



Supporting a Healthy Community...

We live in a rapidly expanding metropolitan area with ever-changing demographic characteristics and an uncertain future when it comes to health care. Unfortunately, many in our community are unable to obtain adequate healthcare on their own and rely on **Parkland Hospital** (2008) in its role as the safety-net hospital in our county. With an aging and in many ways obsolete facility, the decision was made by Parkland to build a new state-of-the-art hospital. We were pleased to join in this effort and now can see the fruit of years of hard work rising from the new Parkland campus. We believed in 2008 and continue to believe today that this new facility is long overdue and essential to the delivery of quality health care services across a wide spectrum of need in our area.



Compassion for Companion Animals...

The welfare of companion animals has emerged as an avid interest of the Foundation, not only for the welfare of the animals, but also for the benefits we derive as human beings from these animals. The **SPCA of Texas** (2007 & 2009) offers thousands in our community the opportunity to experience the joy of pet ownership while rescuing an animal that needs a home. More than that, owning and caring for a pet provides lessons in personal responsibility, compassion, respect for authority, patience and even humility. These are all character traits that we view as positive and worthy of emphasis in all of the programs we support as a foundation. Programs that teach these character traits, especially to our children and youth, have become high priorities for the Foundation.



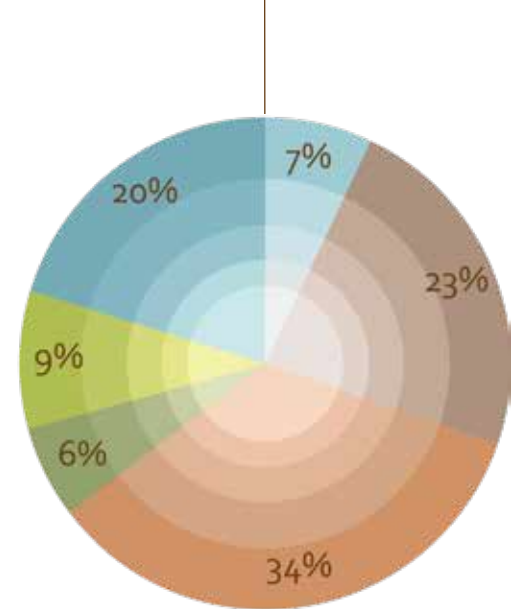
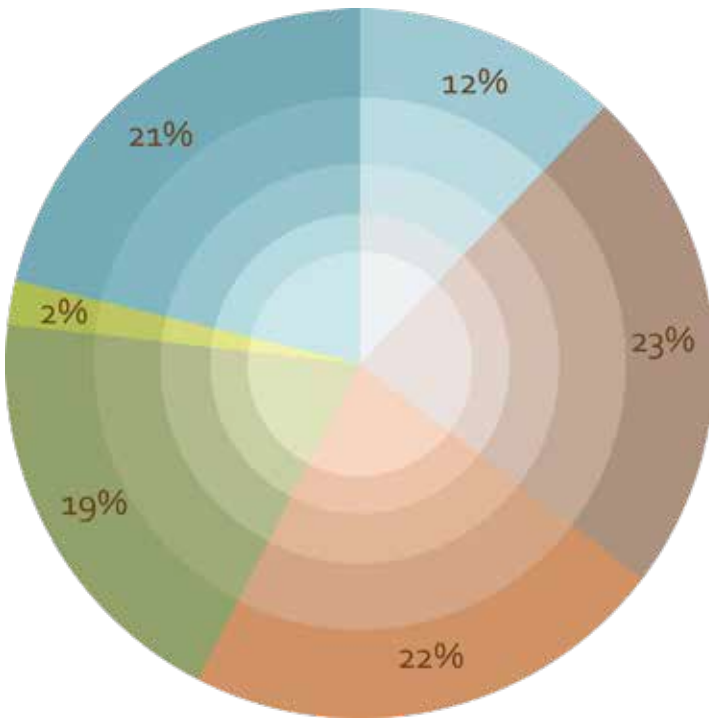




Distribution of Dollars Granted by Program Area

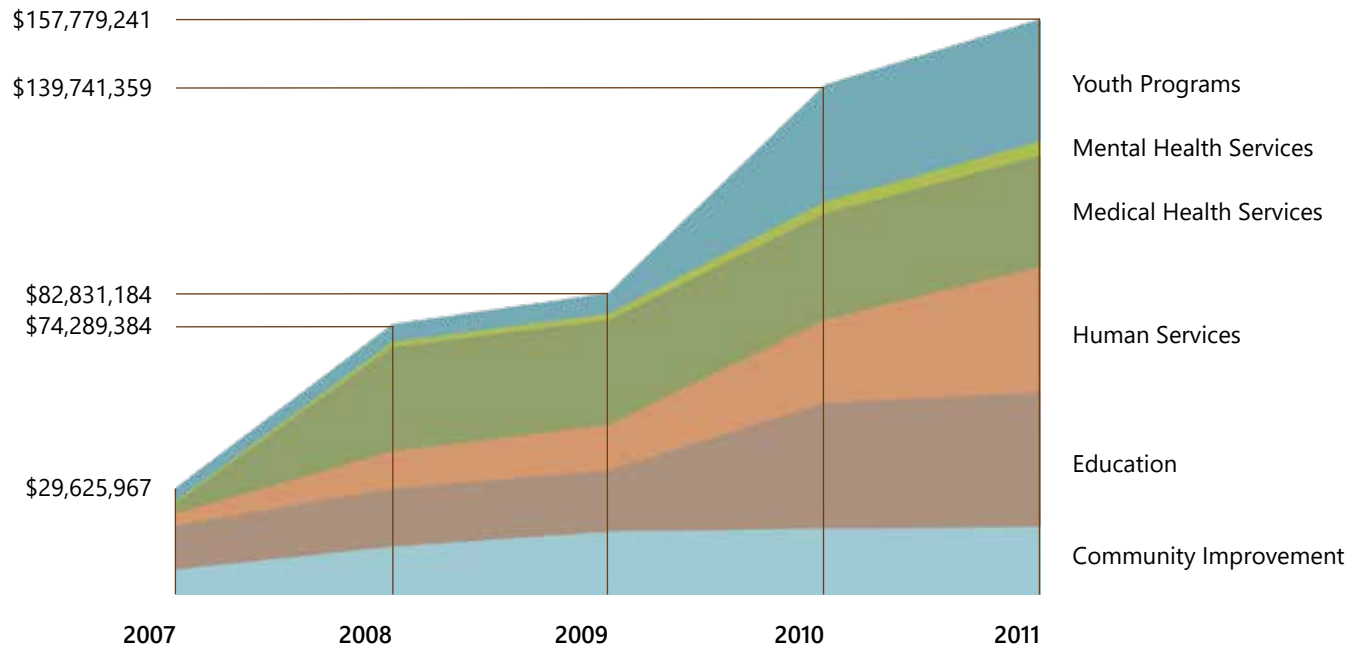

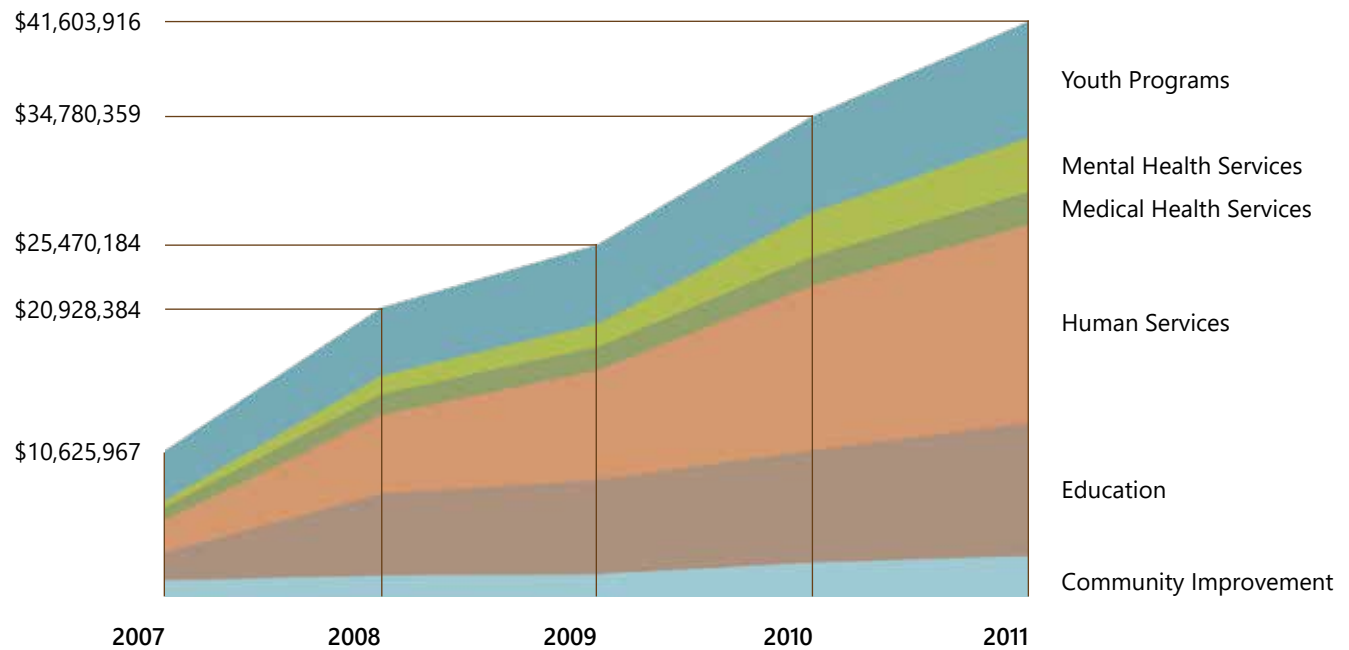

Progression of Dollars Granted by Program Area - Without Grants over \$1 Million

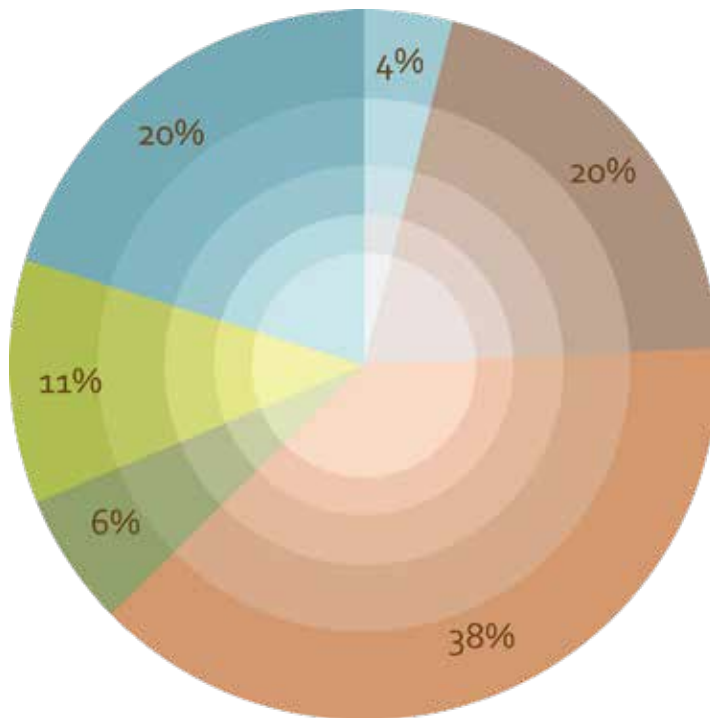

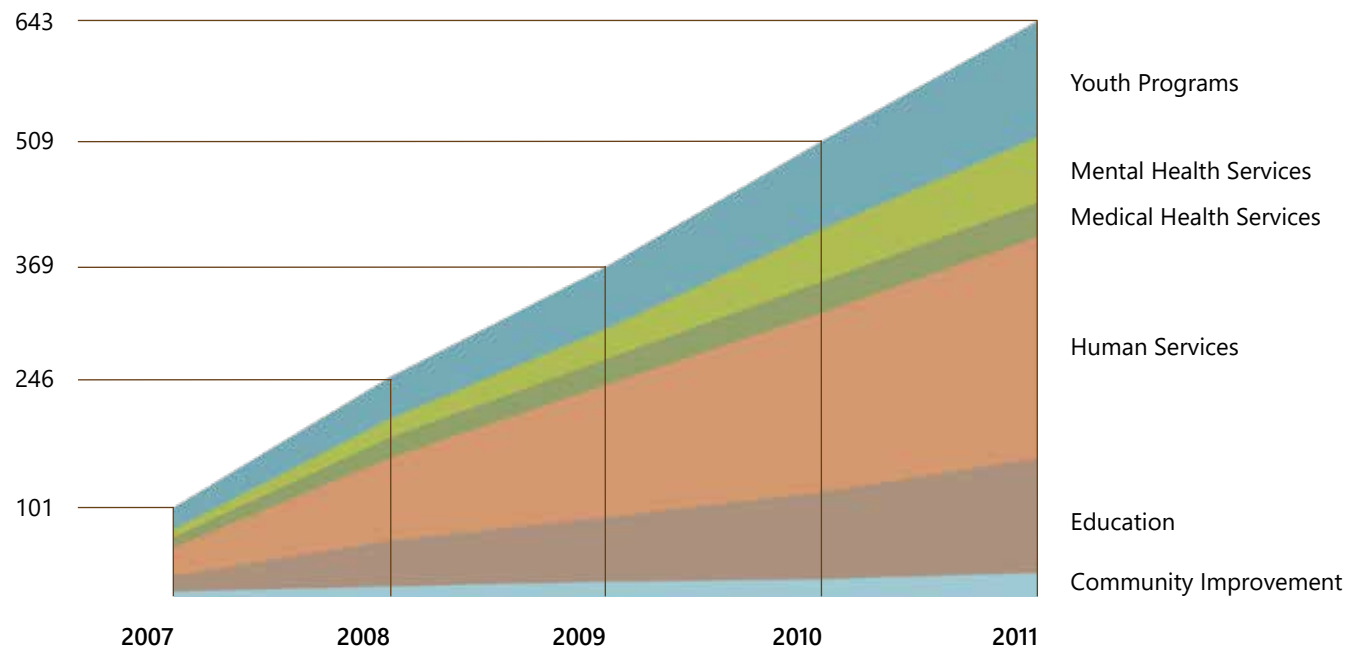

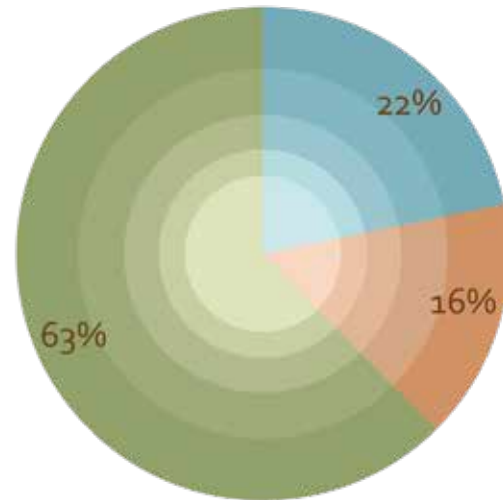

Distribution of Grants by Type of Grant

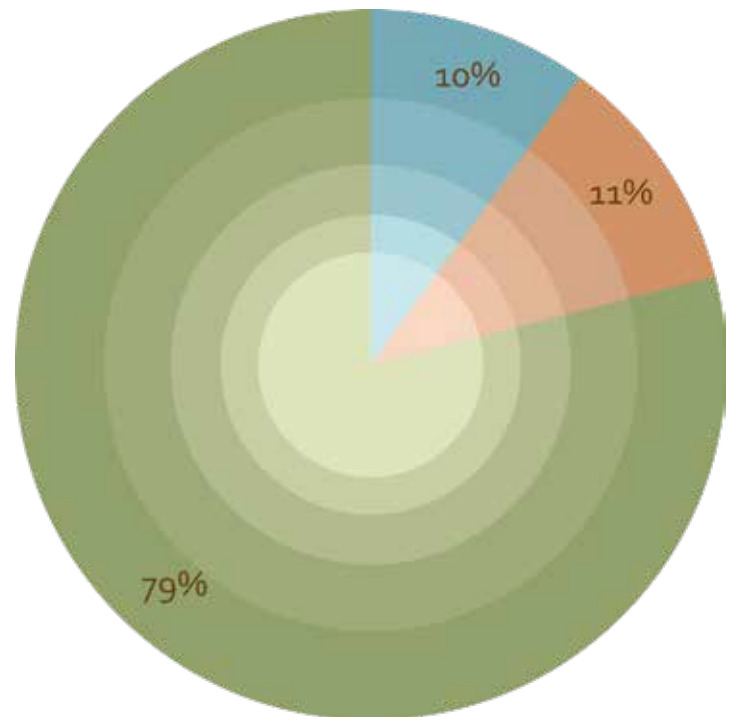
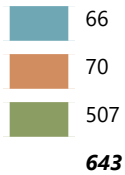

Healing Hurt Children...

Our support of **TCU's Institute of Child Development** (2008 & 2011) illustrates our commitment to supporting programs that enhance the development of children who, in the words of Dr. Karyn Purvis, one of the co-directors of the Institute, come from "hard places." Programs that assist children who have been abused or neglected or who have mental or emotional challenges that derive from difficult early life experiences are of the highest priority for the Foundation. We were lucky to discover the Institute in 2008 and have been blessed to assist in its work for the last 4 years. Through its Trust-Based Relational Intervention methods, the Institute is not only easing the suffering of the children it touches directly, it is sharing its methods with thousands of other professionals and through them reaching many more children in need.

Helping Those Who Can't Help Themselves...

Grants to the **Dallas Children's Advocacy Center** (2010) for their new Center for Child Protection and to **Children's Medical Center** (2011) for their foster care clinic reflect the high priority we place on child protection and the care of children who have experienced abuse or neglect. These children suffer physically and mentally in ways we cannot imagine. DCAC's new facility will enhance its ability to facilitate investigations of instances of abuse or neglect and then provide therapeutic services to the affected children and their families. The programs being developed at Children's are designed to provide ongoing coordinated medical care and therapeutic services for children living in foster care. In the first instance, immediate protection is provided; in the second, growth and healing are pursued. Both are important objectives of our Foundation.

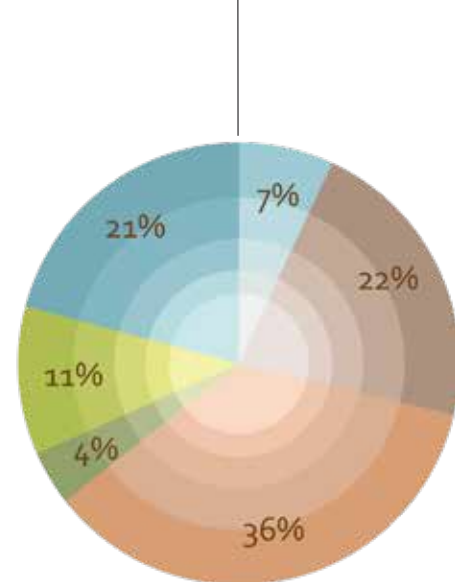
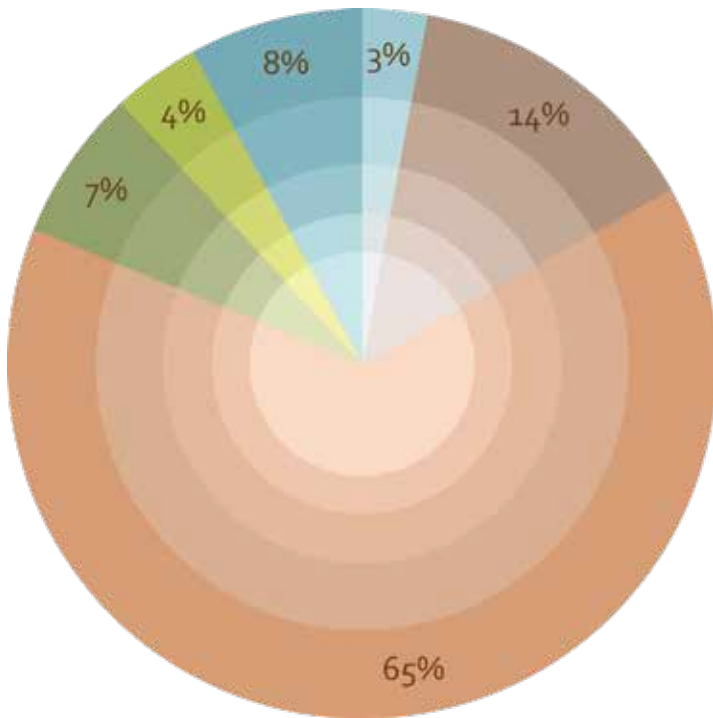

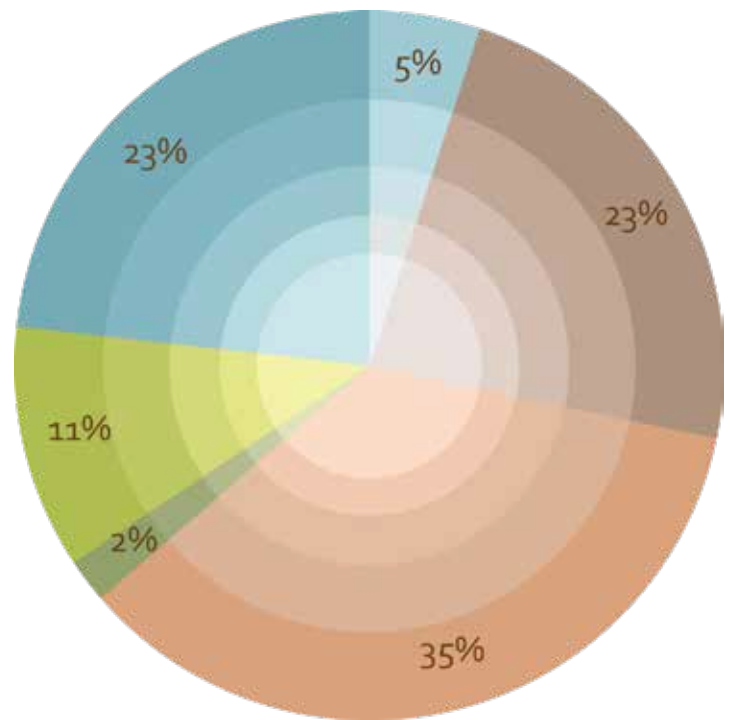


Distribution of Grants by Program Area
